GOOD FRIDAY TO EASTER!

Vou should receive this newsletter about the time we enter Holy Week that begins with a celebration of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, then follows Jesus' conflict with religious leaders, the Seder Meal with his friends, his arrest, trial, and crucifixion---all the events that transpired during his last week of life.

Christians have used this week to reflect on their own walk with Jesus and to prepare for Easter by examining their priorities and values. Good Friday becomes a symbol of our own death---physical and spiritual.

Over the last few days, our congregation has experienced a number of "Good Fridays." We will have memorial services on consecutive days for Bill Regele and Curt Cook. Tim Stover lost his father, Wayne; Melody Briggs lost her mother, Debbie; and Esmeralda Allen lost her Aunt Benita. We have other members of our church family who have been in and out of the hospital.

In addition, both Courtney and I are experiencing grief over the loss of a pastoral relationship with our Corvallis church family that will take place at the end of June.

All of us experience small "deaths" when things change. I just received a poignant email from an old friend whose spouse's physical and mental health has deteriorated. In it she remarked, *We had fun for many years, but now he has changed. I miss the man I married, but I will care for him as long as possible.* Our friend is experiencing a "Good Friday" in her relationship.

Thanks be to God, however, that from death springs life! When we gather for worship on Easter, we celebrate our faith that proclaims resurrection always trumps death whether that is the loss of loved ones, the end of a particular dream, a change in relationships, or a change in worship services.

As one hymn proclaims, *This is a day of new beginnings, time to remember and move on, time to believe what love is bringing, laying to rest the pain that's gone. For by the life and death of Jesus, God's mighty Spirit, now as then, can make for us a world of difference, as faith and hope are born again.*

Yes, as faith and hope are born again!

Let's pack the sanctuary on Easter morning -9:30 a.m. – and celebrate our journey from Good Friday to Easter. Invite some friends who need the encouragement of God's Spirit.

There is transition from life into death and finding ourselves out of that death. Transition from season to season. There is the transition from Palms to death to Resurrection. Transition from pastor to pastor. Transition of moving into new ways to respond to one another. From mourning to celebration and perhaps back and forth between the two. There is newness in baptism as well as closing other chapters.

So where does that leave us all? Well, here we are together. We have been choosing one another. We are left with just us, just community, just this time and place. We are ready to prepare for new things and different stages. We are ready to take on new challenges and say goodbye to those very dear to our hearts.

Barbara Brown Taylor writes a book about a large transition in her life. In her work as an Episcopalian priest she discerns that she no longer is called to be in the parish. Her life then transforms into rediscovering the holy in her moments as a priest out in the world. She has to find where she is in the mix of transition. She writes,

"A priest is a priest, no matter where she happens to be. Her job is to recognize the holiness in things and hold them up to God. *Her job is to speak in ways that help other people recognize the* holiness in things too. For twenty years I had done that in churches, surrounded by ecclesiastical furniture, stained glass, and sacred language, and congregational expectations that kept me every mindful of my vocation. Now I was going to try working without a net, in a room that might yet become a sanctuary." Leaving Church, a memoir of Faith pg. 204-205.

We are all called to such a priesthood! We believe that all are ministers along the way and all have a call on our hearts to speak of God and hold up holiness to people. We are all called to see where we can find holiness in everyday things and people.

Here is the challenge as we look to Easter, the Resurrection, newness, and celebration. How will we find holiness in everything? How will we hold that up? How will we lift our voices to make our surroundings a sanctuary? How will we recognize God even though we may be busy in recognizing the changes?

This is the theme of a ONE YEAR CAPITAL CAMPAIGN adopted by the Church Council at its last meeting. Did you know that when our current capital campaign ends on May 31, we will have reduced our debt by \$300,000? In addition, we have installed energy efficient windows in the education wing, contributed over \$23,000 to Camp Magruder and are completing plans for lighting the Monroe Street parking lot! The goal of this one year capital pledge drive will be to reduce as much debt as possible. Campaign information will be sent out after Easter and we will have the opportunity to make a new, one year commitment on Pentecost Sunday, May 23.

April Trivia

- April 19, 1775 the American Revolutionary War began.
- April 2, 1792 the first gold prices were fixed by Congress at \$19.39 an ounce.
- April 3, 1860 the Pony Express began.
- April 9, 1865 General Robert E. Lee commander of the Confederate Army surrendered to U.S. Grant and the official end of the American Civil War took place.
- April 30, 1939, television first publicly broadcast, from the Empire State Building.
